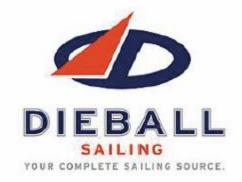




What Makes Good Sails Great?

Bob Reynolds Receives Life Membership to I.S.C.A.

Mr. Bob Reynolds, Port Clinton Ohio has joined a very elite list of individuals including Vince

DiMaio, Paul Koch, Norm Winkel, Bob Balmert, Dennis Dieball Sr., Thomas Ehman Sr., George Fisher, Wm. Ripley Harrison, and Terry Kilpatrick, all who have

made outstanding contributions to the Interlake Sailing Class Association or the sport of sailing by receiving a Life Membership to I.S.C.A.

Bob was recognized at the Sandusky One Design Regatta, June 9-10 in conjunction with the weighing ceremony of "Norm" a wood Interlake

Bob's entire working career has been spent building boats. For 25 years, until the plant closed in the '70's, Bob was an instrumental component in all areas of production at the Matthews Boat Works in Port Clinton, Ohio. For those of you not familiar with Matthews, the company's main forte was the production of quality wood cruisers mostly in the 35' – 50' range. He also spent 5 years working for Lyman Boat Works in Sandusky.

Presently, Bob holds the position of being the head instructor of the Boat Building School at the

Sandusky Maritime Museum. For the past three years, the main project of the school has been the construction of "Norm" a wood Interlake.

Bob has been a hands-on mentor dealing with all aspects and every detail associated with this project guiding approximately five other retired individuals, most of

whom continue to sail an Interlake, or who once owned an Interlake. Over the last three years, Bob has contributed not only has vast knowledge in wood boat building procedures skills, but approximately 500 hours to this continuing project. Living in Port Clinton, Ohio he has driven over 5,500 miles which converts to an additional 120 hour of

drive time just to get to our worksite at the Museum in Sandusky.

Like all of us working on the project, Bob has developed a much greater appreciation of what the boat is, why it was originally designed and what it represents 80 years later. Bob, and all of us working on "Norm", look forward to the day she will be sailed and then will permanently preserve the history and heritage of the Interlake Class by becoming one of the premier displays, complete with cotton sails, at the Sandusky Maritime Museum.



Intercom Tips and Techniques

Roll Tacking the Interlake

Recently I've had the good fortune to sail a number of different boats. The thing that is most interesting to me is how each boat reacts when you do something with the tiller. For example, a boat such as a Finn or Thistle, with a relatively balanced helm, will react quickly with the slightest tough of the helm. The result of such movements causes the boat to decelerate rather fast. Consequently, steering these boats with weight movements and sail trim is critical.

Conversely, boats such as the Star or the Lightning have appendages that help reduce the helm (skegs), but those same appendages make it far more difficult to execute tight maneuvers effectively. Planning ahead when you want to make a maneuver (flat water) is critical. Being less aggressive typically leads to better speed out of these maneuvers.

The Interlake is unique. Because it is not 100% balanced all the time, it is easy to make small maneuvers to windward, and tough to drive to leeward. Controlling the pace of these maneuvers and focusing on the "exit" speed of the tack or gybe is most important.

When planning for a tack in the Interlake, I talk with my team about "synchronizing" the maneuver. My technique is easy and something that can be immediately used by your team. It is the 1,2,3 method.

"ONE" comes after you inform the crew that you are getting ready to tack. It basically means that you are about to turn the boat. Weight should be moved slightly to leeward. The biggest mistake I've seen is too many people over-heeling the boat prior to a roll tack. You only need to heel enough to allow the boat to "track" into the wind. I suggest 5-7 degrees of heel.....anything more and you will stall out what little flow there is on the rudder and make it difficult to recover on the "exit". Going into the tack with too little heel has a similar implication (rudder drag) and is probably even slower.

"TWO" is when you are about to enter the eye of the wind. The crew should be ready to flatten and the sails should be trimmed slightly harder.

"THREE" is when you actually roll the boat and should be announced when the boat is just through the eye of the wind. The jib can be backwinded (or boxed) slightly to help steer the boat and the main should be uncleated to make sure that the skipper can ease the sail out of the next tack for balance and to get the boat into 1st gear. The amount of roll depends on the amount of breeze. If it is lighter winds, the roll can be increased. If it is heavier, I would caution how much you roll the boat.

Many teams I have coached over the last 5 years have implemented "Four". That is when you are on the next tack and you flatten the boat, trim the sails and get from 1st gear to 2nd gear out of the tack. As the wind varies, you have to be careful that the fourth maneuver isn't executed too hard. If you do, you risk breaking the rules (Rule 42), but even more important you can do more damage by exhausting the wind out of the sails after the roll back.

Skipper's responsibility through the Roll Tack

The driver has to make sure the boat is going as fast as possible through the maneuver. Pace of the turn, navigating through the waves and coordinating the turn with the commands is vital to a successful Roll Tack.

Many times, I've seen drivers "lean" into the boom to induce the initial roll to get the boat to turn. With the Interlake, you don't have to be that aggressive. In fact, just by getting in off the rail and/or standing straight up will typically give you the necessary heel needed to allow the boat to track into the breeze.

The skipper also has the responsibility of controlling the mainsheet through the tack. Many folks just cleat their mains through the maneuver. This is a wasted opportunity to use the sails to turn the boat by trimming hard in the

"One" and "Two" stages and easing in the "Three" and "Four" stages to get the boat to accelerate through the tack. The thing that I try to remember the most is to have the leech hard through the tack and eased out of the tack.

Crew's responsibility through a Roll Tack

Primarily the crew must be in sync weight-wise. With regard to the tack, the crew is an extension of the skipper's weight. If the skipper slides in to initiate the tack and doesn't get that 5-7 degree heel, the crew might have to help by sliding in or to leeward to help. Slight changes in weight by the crew go a long way.

Through the "Two" stage, the crew should be working to make sure that the boat is being rolled through the eye of the wind. The "Three" stage is when the crew hits the old windward/new leeward rail to roll the boat.

The "Four" stage is very critical. If there's too much wind for the skipper to flatten the boat, the crew needs to assist. Additionally, if the breeze is very light, the crew might have to stay on that rail longer to keep the boat

heeled as the skipper moves to the new windward side out of the tack.

If you sail primarily 2-up, it is a little tougher to execute a good roll tack. Making the above maneuvers a slightly quicker will help. When I sailed with Scott Irwin, I found that I had to be a little more aggressive due in large part my size vs. Scott's. I weigh about 20 lbs. more than Scott, so I couldn't stay in one spot too long and had to "balance" the boat through tacks and gybes more.

The crew needs to use the Jib to help the tack too. As pointed out above, "boxing" the jib will help steer the bow through the wind, but will also assist in rolling the boat. You have to be EXTEMELY careful that the jib is release at the right time, otherwise (in bigger winds) you risk capsizing (if the wind is up) if you can't release....this happened to my team when we practiced for the '93 Nationals on Maumee Bay.

As with most things in sailboat racing, practice is paramount. The more you practice tacking and gibing with your team, the better you will be. If you can't master the above "style" of tacking, simply make sure you focus on going as fast as possible through the maneuver. If counting to yourself helps you pace the tack, by all means do it. A slower, more controlled tack is best.

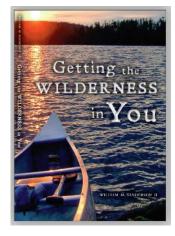

This year's event featured two separate race courses with their own respective RC's plus 20+ on water volunteers ensuring the racing went off without a hitch. In a change from the previous year's format, this year's event featured two days of racing, with a fantastic BBQ dinner on Saturday evening, and a special celebration where the replica of Interlake #1 was launched for the very first time. Mike Muhn and company who have tireless worked on the boat for the last few years organized a 50/50 raffle to raise money for the project. The winner of the "Guess the Weight of Interlake #1" contest was Kevin Bracy, who graciously donated his half of the winnings to the club. A short presentation was held during the launching, where Bob Reynolds was honored with a Interlake Lifetime membership, and received a beautiful plaque created by Terry Kilpatrick for all of his efforts in spearheading this incredible project. Once completed, the replica of Interlake #1 will permanently be on display at the Maritime Museum in Sandusky.

Sailors were greeted on Saturday with fantastic conditions with sunny skies and winds in the 8-15 knot range. Three races were sailed on Saturday with Scott Savage and crew Jeff Jones holding a two point lead over team Ward (Jim and Jayme) and a four

NOTICE OF RACE

1. Rules

- 1.1 This regatta will be governed by the rules as defined in the 2009-2012 Racing Rules of Sailing (RRS) and the Bylaws of the Interlake Sailing Class Association (ISCA) pertaining to sanctioned events.
- 1.2 Bow numbers will be assigned and provided to each entered boat. They shall be displayed on both sides of the hull within 6 inches of the bow.
- 1.3 The following rules will be changed. Changes will appear in full in the Sailing Instructions.
 - 1.3.1 RRS A4.1 & RRS 35 to prescribe time limits on starting and finishing
 - 1.3.2 RRS A2 that there will be no excluded races unless at least 5 races are completed
 - 1.3.3 RRS 61.3, RRS 62.2, & RRS 66 time limits for protests, redress, and reopening hearings

2. Advertising

This event is designated Category C, per ISAF Regulation 20.3, and is subject to the additional restrictions of Article IX of the ISCA Interlake Specifications.

5. Eligibility

- 3.1 The regatta is open to all Interlake Class boats and to all persons who meet the ISCA requirements for sanctioned events contained in Article VI of the ISCA Bylaws, who are members of the Association
- 3.2 The Women's Championship is open to all women skippers. The crew can be mixed.
- 3.3 The Junior Championship is open to skippers under 20 years of age on July 18, 2012. The crew may be any age.
- 3.4 The Masters Championship is open to all skippers who are at least 60 years of age on July 19, 2012, who meet the criteria in NOR 3.1. The Masters competition will be sailed in the Championship fleet only.

4. Entry and Registration

- **4.1** Entry forms will be available on the ISCA website and future issues of the *Intercom*. The entry fee for the Women and Juniors event will be \$25 (non-US Sailing members \$30). The entry fee for the Nationals will be \$100 (non-US Sailing members \$105). The entry fee for the Masters Championship is included in the National Championship fee. Entry fees are payable to North Cape Yacht Club and must be postmarked by July 1, 2012. Entries postmarked after July 1, 2012, will be assessed a \$50 late fee.
- **4.2** Eligible competitors may enter by completing the entry form and sending it with the required fee to:

4.3 The deadline for presentation of entries at the event for Women and Juniors is 0930 hours on Wednesday, July 18, 2012. The deadline for presentation of entries at the event for Championship, Challenger, and Masters fleets is 1800 hours on Wednesday, July 18, 2012.

5. Schedule

- **5.1** The Women and Juniors National Championship will be sailed on Wednesday, July 18, 2012. Three (3) races are scheduled and will be run back-to-back. One race constitutes a series.
- **5.2** The Masters Championship will be sailed as part of the National Championship, Thursday, July 19 through Saturday, July 21, 2012.

6. Measurement

Completion of the measurement forms is a mandatory part of registration and must be completed by 1800 hours on Wednesday, July 18, 2012.

- **7. Sailing Instructions** will be available at registration.
- 8. Venue will be in Lake Erie, approximately 2 miles offshore from North Cape Yacht Club.
- 9. Courses will be approved by the NRC and described in the Sailing Instructions. An offset mark may be used when a weather leg is followed by a leeward leg, and a leeward gate may be set at the end of a leeward leg.

10. Scoring

- 10.1 Women & Juniors Championships: Three (3) races are scheduled. One race constitutes a series. A boat's series score shall be the total of her race scores. This changes RRS A2.
- 10.2 National Championship:
 - 10.2.1 Entrants will be divided into the Championship and the Challenger fleets. Choice of fleet is at the discretion of the skipper and declared at registration. If fewer than six (6) boats register for the Challenger fleet, all boats shall race in one fleet and it shall be the Championship fleet.
 - 10.2.2 For the Championship fleet, nine (9) races are scheduled. Three (3) races constitute a series.
 - 10.2.3 For the Challenger fleet, six (6) races are scheduled. Three (3) races constitute a series.
 - 10.2.4 When five (5) or more races have been completed, a boat's series score will be the total of her race scores excluding her worst score. This applies to both Championship, Masters, and Challenger fleets.

11. Support Boats

11.1 Team leaders, coaches, and other support personnel shall stay outside areas where boats are racing from the time of the preparatory signal for the first fleet to start until all boats have finished or the race committee signals a postponement, general recall, or abandonment.

12. Prizes

- 12.1 Championship Perpetual Trophy awarded to the Skipper & Crew placing 1st in the Championship Fleet
- 12.2 Individual trophies to Skippers and Crews placing 1st through 10th in the Championship Fleet
- 12.3 Best First Nationals Award for Skipper & Crew (outside of top 10)
- 12.4 Challenger Perpetual Trophy awarded to the Skipper & Crew placing 1st in the Challenger Fleet
- 12.5 Individual trophies to Skippers and Crews placing 1st through 3rd in the Challenger Fleet
- 12.6 F. K. Holtzman Award awarded to the fleet with the most participation (not the host fleet)
- 12.7 Youngest Sailor Award awarded to the youngest sailor (skipper or crew) sailing in all races in either the Championship or Challenger Fleet
- 12.8 Women's/Juniors/ Masters Perpetual Trophies awarded to the Skippers & Crews placing 1st in the Women's/Juniors/Masters Championships
- 12.9 Individual trophies to Skippers and Crews placing 1st through 3rd in the Women's/Juniors/Masters Championships.

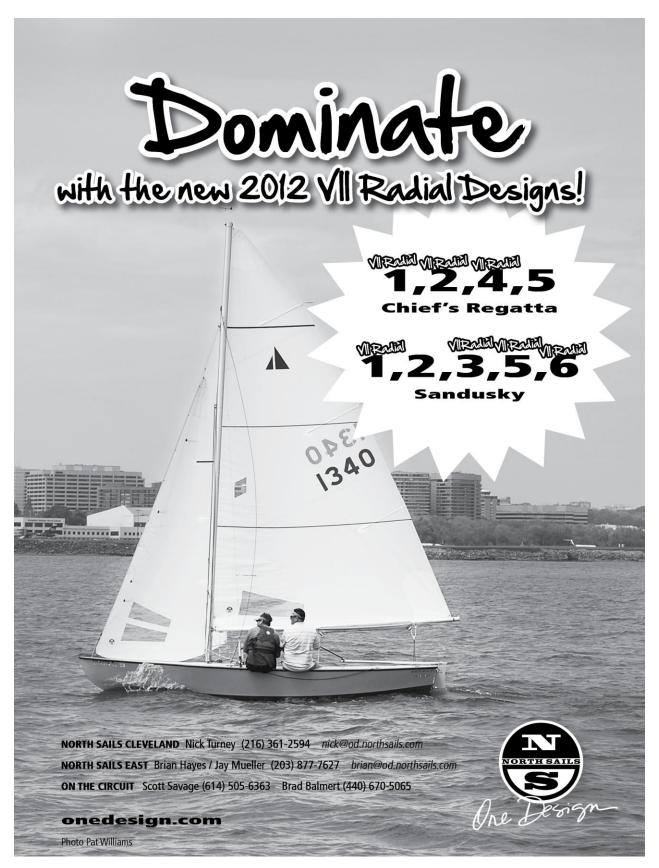
