2013 Interlake Nationals - Sandusky Sailing Club

Sandusky. The home of our beloved Interlake. It is the venue that Francis Sweisguth designed our hard chined machine. It is an incredible sailing location with various parts of the bay providing space for race courses, no matter the wind direction. It is home of some of the most hospitable people I know. A volunteer organization that always goes above and beyond. A true blueprint for how an organization should be run with fun, family and camaraderie the focus.

I've had the good fortune to have sailed at SSC since my early days of Jr. Sailing. I won't date myself here, but it has been dozens of years. When the Interlake was the Bemis Jr. boat! Remember that? Through the years, I've forged many friendships and have many fond memories. Winning the Jr. Nationals with Shelly Gall in '85; winning the Nationals with Scott Irwin; and the last time we had the Nationals in Sandusky, I sailed with my good friend Jeff Eiber. We would again team up for this year's event.

Having sailed many different classes recently, I take my hat off to those responsible for streamlining the measurement process. Going to a certificate format has and will keep the amount of time to measure much It is a process, however, documenting and lower. database complete. the This year's getting measurement process added to the collection of data, but didn't come without the HUGE effort of those that dedicated the time to measure...in the incredibly hot weather. There were many, but hats off to Mike McClinchie, Mike Zuilof, Scott Savage and Clark Chapin, whom I witness putting in a huge amount of time and sweat. There were more and their efforts were greatly appreciated.

The event for me kicked off with the Women's Championship. What?!? Women's? Yeah, the invite to have guys sail with women skippers was extended some

time ago, and Kathy Vanderhorst asked me to sail. She's very keen to learn and I promised I'd help however I could. As we sailed out, we practiced her footwork and timing as we went through some tacks and gybes. Then, a HUGE STORM cloud approached from the Southwest. The committee was prudent, as they should. We shared the course with the Jr teams and there's NO REASON to risk a bad experience. Once back to the dock, it became apparent that the storm was going to pass to the south, but with it so did the time needed to complete racing. It is too bad we couldn't race as it would have been fun to help coach Kathy, but also to race against some great women sailors.

Onto the show, as I call class championships. Racing started on Thursday and this new format of Thursday-Sunday seems to appeal to those with limited family/vacation time. I like it because it brings more boats out, which ultimately means more fun!

Thursday's racing shaped up to be light and spotty. The fun race, featuring NORM, the replica Interlake built by a group of history buffs in Sandusky was postponed a bit in an effort to get into some breeze. It was cool watching (our schedule was pushed back and we couldn't make the start). NORM is a cool looking boat and had all the pace of the others. Of course having Mike Muhn at the helm helps! He's forgotten more than many of us will ever know about the Interlake.



The light winds continued and we only completed one race on Thursday. Jeff and I were fortunate to win this one, but it start/stopped about 2-3 times. If the wind filled in any other place, we'd have found ourselves in a tough spot. As it turned out, we stayed patient on the 1st beat and made some gains from the left. Ron Gall was on fire and rounded the top mark 1st. We squeaked in 2nd hitting the layline inside of 3-4 boats. As we rounded, we were cautious to do too much and to keep the momentum going with our boat, so we did a bear-away and watched a number of boats try to hook into the only puff, which was at the top mark. They looked good initially with Fisher, Huntley, Aspery and Gall all making their way on port. Those of us on starboard, ourselves, E. Dieball, Vanderhorst and Frissell found some good pressure inside....maybe a thermal as it was closer to shore. We caught the most and took it for a victory in a shortened race. Ernie finished 2nd and Surge 3rd. There were a few teams that couldn't find the passing lanes and ultimately posted a big opener.

Thursday, a HUGE front came through. We all knew it was coming. The 90+ degree weather was the tip-off, but also it was forecasted for several days. We were all greeted to nice breeze and PRO Matt Bounds set up shop just in front of Cedar Point. Our windward mark was set off of Battery Park, which meant we were inside the land mass and the shifts came big and often! As the day went on, the wind got bigger and bigger. In fact, by the end of the 3rd (and last) race that day, easing the jib to keep the boat tracking was the norm. That's the most breeze I've sailed an Interlake in for some time.

The story of this day was Bryan Parker's team with his wife Tiffany and cousin Seth. They were on fire and if not for a last beat capsize in the 3rd race that day, they would have gone 1,2,2. As it turned out, they couldn't get the boat sorted and had a DNF in that final race. We ended up winning the day with 2,5,1. We sailed far from perfect, but avoided disaster (a few times!). Steve Aspery's team and Scott Savage's team both sailed really well, which shows that experience and solid boat handling will get you around the course when it is breezy.



Saturday, we had our opening race inside the East Bay again. The wind was more Southerly, which meant many shifts and a shorter race track. We had a decent race having battled back from a bad 1st beat. Peter Frissell, sailing with his brother Bill, had a great race which included charges from Surge Vanderhorst and Bryan Parker. The downwind finish was "bang-bang" first through fourth. It was fun and we nearly pulled out the win, but more important held on to our position as the others were breathing down our neck.

It is at this point where I had ongoing conversations with the class/event management about where we were sailing. The breeze wasn't as strong as Friday and, in fact, seemed to be a perfect day for Interlake sailing in the Main Bay. I "respectfully suggested" to Matt Bounds that we sail in the Main Bay and except for his team having to pick up and reset, it was a great call as the wind, waves and overall length of the course was more "championship" oriented. The Championship Fleet did two more races on Saturday and the Challenger did one more.



Stu Fisher, among many others, found the conditions to their liking as they had room to work their magic. Stu won the 1st race out there (2nd race Saturday) in convincing fashion. We managed to pick up our throwout in a "battle back" from just rounding ahead of a few boats. The left paid huge. Many locals, including Surge and Jim Ward, could be found on the left edge. We played middle-right and got burned. Lesson learned and we nailed the pin and went left in that last race on Saturday for a big win. Don't overthink it, right?

Sunday was the deciding day. We were in control of our destiny and could win the event with a race to spare, if we could finish 6th or better and Scott Savage winning. We knew there would only be 2 races.

Our pre-race intel told us that left would pay, though the wind was almost 180 from Saturday. The left was pretty pronounced with the puffs coming from Johnson Island, so we had a pre-start strategy to start at the pin and keep tabs on Scott's team. As it turned out, Scott and I battled for the pin. The posturing lasted about 35 seconds and we were able to get behind him and control the pin. He started on our hip and had 1-2 above him. We squeezed him off and he tacked behind. As our pre-race intel proved, left paid. We rounded right behind Jim Ward (who levered harder left) and ahead of Bryan Parker's team. Scott was in the top 10, a few back, but had to pull a rabbit out of the hat to win and we were pretty secure in our 6th or Positions changed a little, but nothing better. drastic. The shifts were big, but the left would again come in. Jeff and I secured the win (our 3rd together) with a race to spare. We were very relieved as the event could have flipped a few times (figuratively and literally!).

We used the last race to practice for the upcoming Thistle Nationals. We did something a bit different. We knew that the left would pay, but what if someone had a bad start...could the right come in at any time? So we played the right all the way up the beat. Though we weren't going to win with the right, we got back to the top 5. Likewise, we gybed away at the top and went right again on the 2nd beat. Again, no HUGE gains, but we were able to prove that with some hard work, we could get back. Would this prove of value in the Thistle Nationals? As it turned out (at press time Thistle Nationals concluded and our team finished 2nd), the entire Thistle Nationals was sailed further WSW of the Interlake course. So far to the WSW that many seasoned locals had never sailed there....so much for gaining local knowledge!?!?

Congrats to the many Interlake sailors that came to the Nationals. It wasn't easy sailing, but Sandusky rarely is....which is why we should enjoy it.

Thanks to all my friends at SSC and in particular Bernie Ashyk for his hard work and organization. Hats off to PRO Matt Bounds. Two years in a row he's run our championship and he's done a fantastic job!

Thanks to Terry Kilpatrick for his continued support of the class and being at the championship to help the sailors needing the parts and consultation after hard racing.

Thanks to my friend Jeff Eiber. Not only an outstanding sailor, but better friend and competitor. The best, hands down!

The ISCA has digital records of the final standings for the 1968 Nationals and every event starting in 1970. During that time, 537 different Interlakers have skippered in at least one event.

263 skippers, or just under half, sailed in just one event and 81% have sailed in five or fewer.

Only seven people have sailed in 20 or more events. John Nagle of Indianapolis has 20 and his best finishes were 16^{th} in the Championship Division in 1995 and 2^{nd} in the 2005 Challenger's Division.

Three-time National Champion Scott Savage skippered for the 23rd time this year.

Next up the list with 26 events are Marion Zaugg of Mansfield, OH and 2013 Interlaker-of-the-Year Steve Aspery. Steve is particularly remarkable because his 26 events have been consecutive – he hasn't missed since he finished 17th in the Challenger Division in 1988. Along the way, he has twice been National Champion.


Bob Bradley, who missed this year's Nationals, has attended 27 others.

Longtime stalwart Ray Gall competed in 29 Nationals over this time period and twice finished fifth.

Clark Chapin rounds out the list with 36 Nationals, including this year at Sandusky. He has twice been the Challenger Champion and finished second at Sandusky in 1991. He also crewed (as did many other skippers) in three other events. The 2014 Nationals will be held at his home club, Portage Yacht Club in Pinckney, MI.

At the other end of the spectrum, 50 skippers or 9.3% have sailed in ten or more Nationals. This year, the newest additions to this group were Kevin Bracey, Tim Parker, and the 2012 Champion, Jim Ward.

Hank Boissoneault sailed in his 11th Nationals this year, joining Tom Marriott, Brook Smith, and Craig Tovell at that level.

Bill Sanderson, runnerup in the Masters Division, sailed in his 15th Nationals at Sandusky while Bob Sagan of Grand Traverse Yacht Club notched his 16th event.

Race Replays Now On-line!

And they're off! The ISCA legalized off-line tracking with this year's Specification 14 amendment. With the donation of a set of 10 trackers and software license, and some electronic elbow grease, the ISCA has been able to add a new race replays section to the interlakesailing.org web site. Check out the replays at interlakesailing.org/tracking.


The only software you will need on your PC or Mac browser is the Microsoft Silverlight browser plug-in – available for free by pointing your browser to microsoft.com/getsilverlight.

You can also watch replays at interlakesailing.org/tracking using an iPhone, iPod Touch or iPad, but first you'll need to install the TackTracker app, which is available for free in the Apple App Store. If you already downloaded the TackTracker app, make sure you update it: TackTracker enhanced it at the request of the ISCA so our members can access our replays directly from the interlakesailing.org website. (The developers in Australia have been very cooperative with us!)

The TackTracker presentation is more complete on the PC or Mac: it will give you lots of useful data – leg by leg and tack by tack information on how far each competitor has sailed, how fast they were going, and how high they pointed on both port and starboard tack. It's fun to watch the races replay, and there are plenty of things to learn.

The real value of this system comes when all of the boats have trackers. Then it can be seen who travelled the shortest distance on the windward leg, who was sailing fastest, and who highest. At moments in the race where you may have fallen back, you can see what you were doing in relation to the other boats you were competing with. In the future your dutiful Secretary will be working to increase the number of trackers available and the number of events that are tracked. OLD BUSINESS

A. Specification 14 Proposed Change Voting

Here are the final voting results for the proposed Specification 14:

Ballot A - In addition to devices permitted in the ISAF rules, hand lines which do not extend beyond the gunwale are allowed.

Passed 39 to 0

Ballot B - Mast steps which permit the mast to pivot are not allowed. (numbering change only)

Passed 39 to 0

Ballot C - A communication device may be carried on the boat with the power off, for use only in case of emergency to give help to a person or vessel in danger as allowed under Fundamental Rule 1 of the ISAF Rules.

Passed 37 to 2

Ballot D1 & D2 - No electronic device capable of a racing benefit is allowed on the boat while racing, except that a device may be used if its only capability is

- display the heading direction of the boat, either the heading itself or a number that is calculated using a fixed or adjustable tacking angle;
- 2) display the time of day, elapsed time, or countdown time;

Passed 31 to 8

Ballot D3 - record video, speed, position, and time data, with no display capability and only for later access ashore.

Passed 32 to 7

Ballot E - The Organizing Authority may allow, but not require, VHF radios or other specified communication devices to be used while racing for the sole purpose of communicating between the Race Committee and competitors. If VHF radios or other specified communication devices are to be allowed at an event to communicate between the Race Committee and competitors, the Notice of Race must so state. Passed 33 to 6

B. Fisher Endowment

Steve Aspery presented a plan to roll over the Fisher Endowment into the Class's 501(c)(3). This would strengthen our Class purpose of being an educational and charitable organization. The Endowment has been successful so far. We've had five boats granted and sailed over its five-year history. One of the grantees bought an Interlake and remains active in the Class. Currently the Endowment owns one boat and has \$6000 in the bank. Terry Kilpatrick has suggested a couple of potential used boats that the Endowment can purchase for inclusion as Grant boats.

Steve believes that we can roll the Endowment into the ISCA without any changes to our existing Constitution and Bylaws. Steve proposed that we roll the Boat Grant under the Marketing Committee. We can then establish a budget for the Boat Grant program under the Marketing Budget, and put a cap on it. Under this established budget, the Grant program would be allowed to run autonomously. Steve proposed that the VP of Marketing assign a Chair and Committee to run this, and that the Chair and Committee be the same people that are currently running the program today. Once this happens, the Endowment would be immediately dissolved and all assets would be moved over into the Class.

Steve Aspery made a motion that we accept the proposed operating agreement that was summarized above and to move the George Fisher Boat Grant under the auspices of the ISCA. Mike McClinchie seconded the motion.

Bob Sagan commented that he would prefer more time to review the proposal and to vote on it on a future date.

Steve Aspery made a motion that we postpone the final vote on this proposal by one week and vote by e-mail. Bob Sagan Seconded the motion. The motion was voted on and approved unanimously.

NEW BUSINESS

A. Slate of Officers

Brad Huntley will ask for additional nominations to the Slate of Officers at tonight's Annual Membership Meeting. The additional nominations have to be by signed petition of not less than 10 voting members. The current slate includes – Fritz Everson (President), Mark Presley (Vice President), and Tom Humphrey (Secretary/Treasurer).

Meeting adjourned at 9:39 am. The next Board of Directors' Meeting will be on October 5 at the Poltergeist Regatta in Indianapolis.
