
Inside you'll find details on the upcoming Midwinter Championship, Nationals at Huron Portage, and an article by Skip Dieball on sail life.

The Interlake Nationals will return to Portage Lake for 2014 and Fleet 22 is planning a unique and funfilled event for everybody, not just the hard-core racers.



Convenient, Comfortable Venue

Located near Ann Arbor, Michigan, Portage Lake is a 640 acre stream- and springfilled lake that provides an exciting venue for Interlake

racing. In any breeze at all, the starting area will be less than ten minutes away from Portage Yacht Club's mooring area. Families and spectators can watch the races unfold from the club's panoramic upper deck, or, escape to the Ann Arbor Street Art Fair which begins July 16. Boat/canoe/kayak rentals are also available on Portage Lake (best to reserve in advance).

Easy Meal Schedule

Instead of bag lunches while bobbing on the lake, the fleet will lunch on shore each day in the shaded picnic area or the air conditioned clubhouse.

America's Cup Recap and Update



Following Wednesday's welcome party and competitor's meeting, Thomas Ehman, Jr. will host a "Cupdate" recap of last September's 34th America's Cup and a sneak preview of AC35. Tom

is the Vice Commodore of the Golden Gate Yacht Club and has been actively involved in every America's Cup since 1983, when The Cup was lost to the Australian wing keel.

Racing Format for Nationals

To make the Nationals more accessible to our sailors, the following schedule has been adopted. The Championship Division will sail an 8-race series and the Challenger Division will sail a 5-race series. This schedule allows us to make up races on Friday or Saturday without exhausting the family and casual sailors.

Sail and Boat Pre-measurement for 2014 Nationals



To further reduce the time and effort to complete registration at the Nationals, the pre-measurement opportunities will include measurement of sails.

What's New?

The ISCA has never before performed sail measurement prior to the Nationals. The rationale has been that the difficulty in transporting the sail measurement templates and scarcity of trained sail measurers made such pre-measurement impractical.

Chief Measurer Mike McClinchie has made a commitment to ease this process and there is now an established cadre of experienced boat and sail measurers. In addition, the ISCA Measurement

Committee has developed a series of photo slides to assist new measurers and help train new ones.

Pre-measurement at 3 Locations

There will be three opportunities to measure boats or sails before the 2014 Nationals:

- Sun April 27 at Portage Lake. All of the local boats and sails will be measured.
- Sat June 7 at Sandusky SC. An opportunity for anyone to get sails measured.
- 9 AM to Noon, Sat June 21 at Hoover Sailing Club. An opportunity for anyone to get sails measured.

Who Should Attend

Although the ISCA and Portage Yacht Club (PYC) are encouraging everyone to attend the fun-filled 2014 Nationals at Portage Lake, Any sailor who might attend a future Nationals with the same, un-modified boat can shorten their registration process by taking advantage of the pre-measurement opportunities.

What You'll Get

Sails: If your sails have not been measured before, they will be measured and stamped. For those with the appropriate stamps indicating prior measurement, those sails will simply be stamped for this year.

Everyone competing will return their sail

The addition of sail premeasurement allows an Interlaker to easily register at the Nationals for this or any future year as long as the boat is not modified or new sails purchased. All boats will be weighed at Portage Yacht Club. measurement form to the Registration Desk once signed and completed.

Hull and Spars: If your hull or spars have not been previously measured, your boat will be fully measured at Portage YC. All boats regardless of hull and spar measurement in prior years will be weighed this year (no

exceptions) at Portage YC. Once your measurement form is fully complete and signed, it needs to be returned to the Registration Desk.

Commitment to Nationals Participation

The Chief Measurer and the Board remain committed to making participation in the Nationals easier for everyone while maintaining the quality of our competition.



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Intercom Tips and Techniques

Age of Sails - Designed vs. Ultimate Lifespan



We all come to the same decision point with regard to our sails before every season....are they still good, or is it time to replace them? Hopefully, I can shed some light on some things that you can look to in consideration of determining the health of your sail inventory.

First, we need to establish some general guidelines and terms when we talk about sails aging. Good or bad, as sailmakers, we are tied to class rules in that we have to use Dacron (Polyester) woven material in our upwind sails. By being woven, the cloth has three strength variables in which sailmakers carefully consider when choosing a style to fit the boat of choice: Warp, Fill and Bias. Warp is woven direction that runs the length of the cloth. Fill is the woven direction across the cloth. Bias is the amount of "give" or "stretch" the cloth has across the weave, diagonally. Attached is a chart that is commonly used by sail designers to best match these properties. Over the course of time, the cloth starts to lose its strength in all three directions as the resin that holds the weave together breaks down and the fibers loosen and weaken due to what we call "flex", or in simple terms luffing.

When we match the cloth to the intended layout (i.e. either cross-cut or radial), we then simulate, through our software tools, how the sails age and conform shape-wise to the controls and dynamics of mast, boom, forestay, etc. This is the point where we fine-tune our panel layouts. Recently, we branded this process internally as D-CUT analysis. It yielded a panel orientation that we are confident holds shape through the given wind ranges over the life of the sail. Other layouts you might see utilize different


cloth for the same intended outcome.

So now that we have a introduction on how sailmakers set up the sails, what can you look for as the sails age to best determine if the sail needs replacement? Well, first you have to take in account that sailmakers talk in terms of "Designed Life" vs. "Ultimate Life". Dacron sails have an incredible Ultimate Life. We all know this by the collection of sails that are still usable for day sailing, even if they are soft and the shape seems blown. It is pretty rare for a Dacron sail to meet its fate by ultimately failing (i.e. breaking/shredding). With that in mind, we then need to make sure that we develop an eye for analyzing the "Designed Life" of the sail. This is the shape that the sailmaker designed the sail to be.

Dacron sails tend to breakdown slowly over the course of their life. They are also somewhat "stretchy" in terms of being able to pull on vour various controls (Cunningham, Outhaul. Halvard, etc.) in an effort to get the shape to work for the wind conditions for any given day. So to say that we can get a lot of use out of our Dacron sails is an understatement. If you race a lot, multiple seasons is common expectation.

When I give sails a close look to determine if they are fresh or tired, I usually look at three things: Entry, Exit and Camber (overall depth). Sail analysis tools will factor in Draft

(position of the deepest part of the sail), and I will do that with my eye too, but it is hard if not on the boat. Functionally, this is why you see boats with draft stripes....it is a way for the trimmers to make quick decisions about rig and sail set up. With our relatively static mast/forestay, the need for multiple stripes isn't as necessary.

Entry of a One Design sail is pretty easy to check. It is the angle the sail takes off the mast or forestay. I usually check to see if that angle is really flat or round. If it is nice and faire top-to-bottom, then no adjustment is needed to the sail or the rig. If it is really round, I'll check to make sure that the halyard isn't too tight and/or if the mast doesn't have the necessary prebend, where applicable.

Entry typically affects the Exit. If the Entry is too round, the Exit will likely be too straight or twisted open. If the Entry is too fine, the Exit likely will be round or hooked. The exit can be tweaked with sheet tension and/or lead position, but if you find that you have to make drastic adjustments to get the leech nice and symmetrical top-to-bottom, then you likely need to make an adjustment to the Entry.

The Camber is the last thing I will check when giving a quick look. This is the relative depth of the sail. For most OD sails, the trend has been to go slightly flatter on the sails as most of the boats can power up pretty easily. This makes my quick analysis easy as I can tell if a sail is DEEP or has an appropriate amount of overall depth. Where that depth is located (DRAFT) is the final element, but can be tweaked too, given adjustments. You can also tweak the Camber, but it is tough with a non-bendy rig and relative tight shroud settings. Attached is an analysis document that we often use when we do sail scans. You'll see the variables in action.

Recently, we partnered with a company called VSPARS. They are New Zealand based and we have their Olympic software. It can take hundreds of timelapsed photos and produce a far more accurate analysis of a sail, rather than a single, static photo. We have used this to update our tuning guides and overall designs. Analysis technology that feeds our design effort is truly where we spend a great deal of our time.

All this tech-talk is fine. What can you physically see in the sails that might tell you that the time has come to replace them? Check the inboard end of the batten pockets. If there's significant cloth crazing, that's a sign. Look at the clew section of the jib as it tends to get beaten up back by the mast. Also, give the luff a good look for wear and tear, but also boltrope shrinkage. Boltropes can be re-adjusted and give a nice quick fix, but going through that exercise is an indication that your main is approaching the end of its design life.

Got time to photo your sails? Send them to your sailmaker. Take a digital from mid-foot and make sure you get as much of the sail in the frame as possible. Trim optimum to the wind and make sure you communicate the wind velocity. Mainsail photos are easier than jib photos, but do your best to get a clear photo. Most sailmakers can provide you with technical feedback to help determine set up and overall sail age.

Eight Bells – Paul Koch and Hugh Elliot



Paul Koch – ISCA Honorary (Life) Member

Paul Koch passed away peacefully Tuesday, Nov. 19, 2013 in Stein Hospice Care Center following a brief illness. Paul was a lifelong sailor who won the Interlake National Championships three years in a row. He is also credited with introducing the boom vang to the Interlake class. He was a past commodore (1959) and life member of SSC as well as a life member of the Interlake class. Paul and Jim Johns teamed up to create the Steeplechase Race for the one design boats to race to Bay Week. They soon after created the Deepwater Race for auxiliary boats to race to Bay Week as well. He also served several years as a USYRU (now US Sailing) judge.

Not only did Paul receive every possible award/distinction at SSC, he was also the recipient of the "Nick of Time Award" for saving the lives of two ice fishermen who had fallen through the ice on Sandusky Bay.

Hugh Elliot – Judge at 2006 Nationals

Hugh Elliot, who served as Chief Judge at the 2006 Nationals at Hoover, passed away suddenly on Sunday 2-Feb while judging an event at Davis Island Yacht Club in Tampa, FL.

As a young adult, he was an elite, avid Laser sailor in the mid-1980s. He enjoyed crewing, most often as tactician or spinnaker trimmer, on other boats including Flying Dutchmen, J/24s, Lightnings, and J/30s. And, in typical Hugh fashion, he not only raced, he gave back - serving as a Vice President in the North American Laser Class and on the International Laser Class World Council.

An auto accident in the 1993 nearly cost him is life. He lost his left leg (above the knee) and later his right leg (below the knee). As an amputee, he turned his energy to Paralympic sailing. He helped to establish the U.S. Disabled Sailing Program and from 1997 to 2000 he campaigned as crew on a Sonar; his team finished second at the U.S. Trials for the Paralympic Games in Sydney. He continued campaigning in Sonars as skipper until 2005.

He went on to serve as Chairman of US Sailing's Sailors with Special Needs Committee.

In October of 2008, Hugh received the Gay S. Lynn Memorial Trophy by the Council for Sailors with Disabilities for his outstanding contribution to sailors with disabilities and to the sport of disabled sailing.

He also gave back as judge and race officer. He was a US Sailing Senior Judge for over 30 years, and became an ISAF International Judge in 2006. And when not judging or sailing, he could usually be found on either a race committee boat or his own boat, Allegro.

Born in England, he moved to the United States as a young adult and became a US citizen. He was an active member at Severn Sailing Association and Davis Island Yacht Club. Hugh was known for a great sense of humor, wry wit, open mind and avid intellect. A whole generation of judges and race officers in Annapolis, Maryland point to Hugh as a key mentor, teacher, and role model.

Velocitek Shift Compass

The Velocitek Shift compass recently entered the market. This compass, however, is not class (ISCA) legal. The Shift has capabilities that go beyond Article III 14D in our class specifications. This compass stores both a port and starboard tacking angle, and the rule only allows one angle to be stored. Additionally, this compass displays three numbers: boat heading, tacking angle, and lift or header value. Our rule only permits the heading or a number that is calculated using a fixed or adjustable tacking angle to be displayed.

- 14. Hardware: Optional except:
- [a, b, and c omitted]
 - d. No electronic device capable of a racing benefit is allowed on the boat while racing, except that a device may be used if its only capability is
 - 1. display the heading direction of the boat, either the heading itself or a number that is calculated using a fixed or adjustable tacking angle;
 - 2. display the time of day, elapsed time, or countdown time;
 - 3. record video, speed, position, and time data, with no display capability and only for later access ashore.

Nominating Committee


Old Business
