An Interlake Cruising Vacation

The Howell Family Sets Sail

While many of you were sailing at Interlake Nationals at Portage Yacht Club this July, our family dug out the "old sails" from the garage and headed out on a slightly different summer Interlake experience. This skipper had to set aside his racing tendencies (which are diminishing with age) for two weeks while we all had some family fun at a more leisurely pace. And what a treat it was!

On Friday, July 18, we loaded up the boat, toys, playpen, dog, clothes, beach toys, diapers, etc. and drove from Alexandria, VA to Andover, MA where we stopped for the night at a pet-friendly hotel. Departure time was about 9:40 am; arrival time was after 11:00 pm. The bathroom and meal stops take longer with three kids and a dog than they used to when it was just Ashley and I headed to weekend regattas....but I'm not so sure that's a bad thing!

The following morning, we drove the last short leg (2.5 hours) from Andover, MA to Frye Island, ME. Along the way there was a stop for a week's worth of groceries. The van and Interlake fit nicely on the 9-vehicle ferry to the island. And then it was just a short drive to the house we had rented for the week. I unhooked the Interlake in the driveway and we spent the rest of the day getting settled in our home for the week. Oh....and we had to celebrate Ashley's birthday, so the kids sang, we had special birthday treats and I made adult drinks in the blender...while many of you were doing much the same at the closing dinner for Interlake Nationals!

Frye Island is a quiet little slice of paradise located in the middle of Sebago Lake in Maine. Sebago is Maine's second largest lake and the water is swimming pool clear and 316 feet deep at its maximum. Frye Island is 2.5 miles long, 1.5 miles wide, has a 9 hole golf course, one restaurant/store/ice cream stand in one. All 22 miles of roads are dirt and the island speed limit is 20 mph. Golf carts and bicycles are the primary form of transportation. The island has a dozen public beaches.

On Monday, I had to face one of my most dreaded parts of this trip. All of our sailing on this vacation was ramp launching - no cranes. So the bottom cover needed to come off. Our Interlake #1395 has NEVER been down the road without a bottom cover. My racing sensibilities were trembling thinking of all of the hours I've spent making the hull as smooth and slippery as possible (which isn't reflected in our race results). But it's all going to be okay I tell myself....family first! Alder (age 8) and Malina (age 6) were a big help pulling off the bottom cover while I crawled under the boat to lift it off the trailer bunks. Hampton (age 19 months) supervised from inside the cockpit. Then after lunch it was off to the south end of the island to launch the boat at Long Beach Marina, a community owned facility that charges just \$150 a week for transient slips. We were the only sailboat in the marina (I don't consider Macgregor 26's to be true sailboats).....which also made us the best looking boat! I spent an hour or so raising the mast and rigging the boat while the rest of the family spent some time at the community playground on the island. Once I was ready to launch, I went to the playground and picked up the older two kids to help me. The three of us launched the boat with no trouble and paddled to our slip for the week. We got the boat tied up and covered and then it was time for another trip to the beach.

The next day provided a forecast that was perfect for a day's sailing with the family: 80 degrees and light winds (5-7) in the morning building to 11-12 in the afternoon. After an, "I don't want to go" tantrum by the six year old, off we went to the marina. We paddled out of the marina, raised sail and headed off for a clockwise circumnavigation of Frye Island. We made slow progress in the light wind. Then Adler decided he wanted to get wet, so lines were draped off the back of the boat and immediately Adler and Ashley were in the water. Then Malina jumped in. I expected hesitation from the kids about jumping into water up to 300+ feet deep, but they were fearless. After a refreshing swim all were back onboard and we put the spinnaker up. But wait, this prudent skipper ignored the navigation marks and suddenly we're looking at beautiful, massive granite boulders just five feet below the surface. A quick spinnaker takedown and a turn to windward got us safely away from the shoal without scraping bottom. We then decided to stay to the south end of the island for the day. The breeze freshened and we had a nice upwind sail while Ashley distributed snacks to our junior crew members. An hour or so later, the kids wanted to get wet again and the wind has subsided so we rolled up the jib and took turns going for a swim. Even little Hampton reveled in the refreshing waters of Sebago Lake. Then we headed back to the marina where we are greeted by a young family of ducks. The kids fed the ducks a small bag of animal crackers while smiling and laughing joyfully. Ashley and I reveled in their laughter.....this is what a family vacation is all about!

While putting the boat away we met another family who had rented a powerboat for their two week stay on the island. They told us about "candy bar bingo" at the community center that evening, and the kids become ecstatic. So it was back to our cottage for a late lunch/early dinner and then off to the community center where the kids had a great time with thirty or so other island kids on vacation.

Back home, Tuesday night beer can racing on keelboats was underway and I wasn't there. And guess what....that was okay. I had sailed several miles that day without a starting sequence, tight mark rounding, or any thought about maximum boatspeed or VMG. Instead it was laughter and swimming and the discovery of new places with the sponge-like minds of young children. Later that evening, I posted a picture of the kids on the boat on Facebook with the caption, "Best. Sailing. Day. Ever." That pretty much summed up the day for Ashley and I.

We continued to enjoy Frye Island and Sebago Lake for the rest of the week. Then it was on to Swainn's Lake, New Hampshire for another week of vacation joined by both sets of grandparents. Swainn's Lake turned out to be a great lake for

fishing, canoeing and kayaking, but not for sailing. The Interlake never made it in the water, but we spent many hours rowing around the small lake.

Fast forward to Monday, August 4 – I had been wearing flip-flops for the previous two weeks. I wondered if anyone at the office would notice if I wore them on my first day back to work? And this same day, Adler started a week of sailing camp for his first time. He enjoyed sailing on Sunfish and Flying Scot's and was proud to be the only kid who had ever sailed in a national championship regatta (Interlake Nationals at Sandusky SC in 2013).

As for sailing on Sebago Lake....this trip won't be our last time. In fact, we hope to make it back in 2016. Sebago Lake took over the top spot from longtime placeholder Geist Reservoir as my all-time favorite place to sail an Interlake. Anyone interested in Interlake Summer Camp in Maine?

I recommend all of you racing Interlakers get the old sails from the garage and take off with your family to some quiet lake you've never been to but always wanted to go. Don't worry about the luff tension or spinnaker trim or the fact that the boat sits in the water for a week. If you don't have your own kids, take your grandkids or the neighbor's kids.....they'll make the Interlake experience much better.

Get-Together Recipes

REUNION NOODLE SALAD

What began as a way to "keep the groom busy before the wedding," turned into an annual regatta and reunion for the Savage family in Columbus, Ohio. The five sons in the family, who've sailed since they were kids, bring their spouses and join "honorary" family members on the bank of the Scioto River at Leatherlips Yacht Club. The previous year's third-place finisher hosts the gathering one night before the regatta. But this salad always shows up on the menu.

- pound dried linguine, broken into fourths
- 1/3 cup soy sauce
- 1/4 cup water
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 2 cups small cherry tomatoes, halved
- 11/2 cups julienne-cut carrots
- 1 cup fresh pea pods
- ½ cup sliced green onions
- 2 tablespoons sesame seeds (optional) Carrot curls (optional)
- 1. Cook the linguine according to the package directions. Drain the linguine and transfer it to a very large mixing bowl.
- 2. In a screw-top jar, combine soy sauce, water, olive oil, lemon juice and garlic. Cover and shake well. Pour over hot linguine; cool.
- **3.** Add the tomatoes, carrots, pea pods and green onions to linguine. Toss gently. Cover; chill for 2 to 24 hours.
- 4. Bring the linguine mixture to room temperature. In a large skillet, toast and stir the sesame seeds over medium-high heat till golden brown. Toss with the linguine mixture and garnish with carrot curls, if you like. Makes 10 to 12 servings.

REGATTA LASAGNA

Relatives travel from all over the U.S. to compete in the Savage family's annual regatta on the Scioto River, says Jan Savage of Columbus, Ohio. After the races, she serves this hearty lasagna, which satisfies everyone's appetite.

- 2 pounds ground beef
- 2 tablespoons snipped fresh oregano or 2 teaspoons dried oregano, crushed
- 1 15-ounce can tomato sauce
- 1 6-ounce can tomato paste
- 1 1½- to 1½-ounce envelope spaghetti sauce mix
- 8 ounces dried lasagna noodles
- 1 teaspoon olive oil
- cups drained cream-style cottage cheese
- 1 beaten egg
- 12 ounces sliced or shredded mozzarella cheese
- 1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese
- 1. In skillet, brown beef, drain. Stir in oregano. Add tomato sauce, paste and spaghetti sauce mix to beef. Bring to boiling; reduce heat. Cover; simmer for 15 minutes, stirring occasionally.
- 2. Cook lasagna noodles according to package directions, adding olive oil to boiling water. Drain. In a small bowl, stir together cottage cheese and egg.
- 3. To assemble lasagna, in a greased 13x9x2-inch (3-quart rectangular) baking dish, layer half each of the lasagna noodles, sauce, mozzarella, cottage cheese mixture and Parmesan. Repeat layers using remaining ingredients.
- 4. Bake, uncovered, in a 375° oven for 30 to 35 minutes or till mixture is heated through. Let stand for 10 minutes before serving. Makes 12 servings.

Nutrition note: Reduce the sodium by using low-sodium tomato sauce and paste and less spaghetti sauce mix. ■

Nationals - Sailing Grand Traverse Bay

Grand Traverse YC, Traverse City, Michigan August 1-4, 2015 By Jim Milliman, Interlake #730 and Bob Sagan, Fleet Captain, Interlake #1411

It's almost time for Nationals, and as you know they are being sailed in Traverse City, Michigan. Aside from all the wonderful things to do in the area (more on that later!) there is a big, deep, cold bay full of water out there that you will need to learn how to sail.

Sailing on Grand Traverse Bay is simple and there are just a couple of rules; if you tip over you will not be able to touch bottom, the water is clear to about 20 feet or so (thanks zebra mussels), we will sail in about 150 to 200 feet of water, and if the wind is from the north the water is warm and if from the south it will be chilly. Really! From the south the warm surface water is blown out of the bay...sort of weird.

As the water is cold we do get some greater temperature difference from land to water creating a great afternoon breeze. We do not seem to suffer from the August doldrums. That is unless a prevailing weather system dictates it. Usually the wind comes up at about 1 pm. And will stay until 7:30...ish. Usually after that it goes to bed. As you can see from your sailing instructions we are allowing for the option to start early if the wind is there, or postpone and sail later if the wind is typical.

If the wind is from the southwest it is because of an imposing weather system, usually a low with storms to follow. From the southwest and the lower corner of the bay we will likely sail toward that corner. We call it the M-72/Tom's West Bay corner. From this system and prevailing conditions you will experience shifty winds not unlike what you would see on a breezy inland lake. I would love to be able to tell you what side is favored. But alas I am young and still figuring it out myself. Not

uncommon to tack at a header...right into another header. Be patient.

If the winds have been out of the north for a day or two we will experience a leftover wave pattern which will create a challenge if you are beating directly into them. At this point set yourself up to tack into either shore, depending on what side of the bay we may be on, and get out of the slop. Beating directly into the leftover waves is slow.

We seldom have chop. Yea!! Typically the wind will create a rhythmic pattern of predictable waves. If we do have waves remember that Interlakes don't take well to pinching and you may need to foot off to keep your speed. Rocking yourselves up and over each one.

Do some research. Sail the bay and pay attention to what the wind does after you get closer to shore. Not uncommon to have it pay big with a lift as you get closer. But do the research to see what the "doctor" is up to on that particular day. Enjoy your ride on the bay.

Things to do in TC. The Traverse City Film Festival runs the week prior to Nationals through August 2. There will be approximately 10 different screens showing classics, small productions and the select blockbusters. Many free kids' activities. Yes a bit of Hollywood comes to TC for the week. So consider coming early for some films. Downtown is nuts during this week. Lots of great wineries and breweries to visit as well. Beaches on the west side of Leelanau peninsula. Sail your boat after the regatta up to Power Island with a picnic. This entire island is a park with a great beach and hiking trails.

This is only the tip of the iceberg. Enjoy your visit to our neck of the woods. Here are some websites to google/checkout:

2015 Travelers' Series Notice of Race

For many years, the Interlake Sailing Class Association (ISCA) has sponsored the Travelers' Series as a measure of performance through a year's series of regattas. The 2015 Travelers' Series will be run on a calendar year basis including all regattas that meet the requirements of the rules below:

- Series Approval. The regattas to be scored in the series are approved by the ISCA Board of Directors at the beginning of the sailing season. Proposals for inclusion in this series are submitted to the ISCA in January at the Fleet Captains' meeting.
- 2) **Changes.** Any changes to this series notice will be published in the Intercom and a copy mailed to the current list of Fleet Captains as published in the Intercom. The changes become official as of the date the notices are mailed to the fleet captains.
- 3) **Eligibility.** The helmsman must be an active member of the ISCA. Race results will be scored for the regattas sailed in which the helmsman was an active member.
- 4) **Schedule.** The regattas that make up this series and their tentative dates appear as listed in the Intercom.
- 5) **Measurement.** The helmsman's boat must meet all specifications of the ISCA at each regatta where it is entered for the results to be scored in the series.
- 6) **Scoring.** The scorekeeper awards to each helmsman one point for a first place finish in any of these regattas, two points for a second place finish, and so forth, as reported in the Intercom or ISCA website. All scores from a regatta marked with a "**" in the schedule count as two regattas with the same score. To qualify for a trophy, a helmsman must have sailed in sufficient regattas to have no less than five (5) scores. Trophies are awarded on the basis of each helmsman's best five (5) scores. Points are earned based on regatta's final standings as published in the Intercom.
 - a) Nationals Challenger Fleet for the purposes of the Travelers' Series, competitors will be scored with the number of points equal to their finishing position in the Challenger Fleet plus 1/2 times the number of boats entered in the Championship Fleet, rounded up to the closest whole number.
 - b) Ties will be broken as follows:
 - i. If there is a series score tie between two or more boats, each boat's **series scores** shall be listed in order of best to worst, and at the first point(s) where there is a difference the tie shall be broken in favor of the boat(s) with the best **place**(s). No excluded scores shall be used.
 - ii. If a tie remains between two or more boats after using the above method, the tie shall be broken using the results of head-to-head competition at the counted regattas to be determined by which beat the other boat the most times. No excluded scores shall be used.
 - iii. If a tie remains between two or more boats after using the above methods, they shall be ranked in order of total boats beaten in the counted regattas. No excluded scores shall be used.
 - iv. If a tie still remains between two or more boats after using the above methods, they shall be ranked in order of total boats beaten in all regattas. Previously excluded scores shall be used.
 - c) Abandoned races or regattas in which no races are started shall not be scored.
- 7) Submitting Results. The regatta's host fleet shall be responsible for submitting the scores to the Intercom editor by November 1, 2015. Failure to submit these scores may result in that regatta being removed from the series and will result in those scores being omitted from the current series. Any correction must be brought to the attention of the scorekeeper and documented before December 1, 2015.
- 8) Scorekeeper. The scorekeeper for the 2015 series is Steve Aspery, Past President, ISCA.

The US Sailing National Conference (formerly the "Annual Meeting") was held in Milwaukee

October 23-25. Clark Chapin and Steve Harris were two Interlakers who attended along with Matt Bounds who has been the PRO at our Nationals in 2012 and 2013.

One-Design Level of Activity

Inshore Director Lee Parks presented some data on the level of participation and activity in several large classes. Overall, participation is declining for these classes.

In comparison, the Interlake's experience of membership that has fluctuated between 192 and 225 members over this period is a comparative bright spot.

Awards

The Nathanael Herreshoff Award, US SAILING's highest award for service to the sport, was given to Stan Honey for his accomplishments as an offshore navigator as well as his technical excellence to visualize lay lines and mark zones for the America's Cup.

REACH

US Sailing has developed a program for tying science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) education to sailing. The program has ten different modules and is aimed toward middle school students. Students learn to relate their sailing experiences to weather, wind, water and water quality, and the forces of wind and water.

Although most of the schools utilizing the program are in New England, other programs are active in Sheboygan, WI, Florida, and Long Beach, CA

US Sailing, in addition to publishing the teaching guide, runs training courses for REACH teachers. See the curriculum at http://reach.ussailing.org/.

Membership

The presentation on Thursday by the Membership Department focused on an increased understanding of the diversity of the membership, increased utilization of the MVP Program (which used to be called the Golden Anchor Program), and tailoring communications so that an individual (who may be a member of one or more clubs and class associations), won't be inundated with repetitive email messages.

Financial Status

Financially, US Sailing is stable and has performed to the approved budget for the past several years.

It turned out all right, although my presentation turned into a round-table discussion with 4 other Program Directors, but that's another story...

I highly recommend sending your club's learn to sail chair, head sailing coach or head of your junior race team program to the NSPS next time. So many takeaways...so many great ideas...and so many ways to continue to promote this great sport of ours. Here are some of my favorites:

- Non-traditional learn to sail programming makes our programs stronger with a larger appeal to the public (and membership) as they reach a larger group of students. 85% of all students in your Learn to Sail program will never race...make sure you offer something for them to do after they learn the basics.
- 2. Increasing Adult Education opportunities help make a stronger / happier club (membership). Stop

focusing on the racing and offer a little something for everyone...

- Women's Only Programming
- Powerboat Training
- Introduce a Waterfront Night: get more members to the club
- Think about SUP's and kayaks as a way to get more people to the lake and enjoying your facilities.
- Powerboat Programming through US Powerboat will improve the quality of your Race Management, On the Water Safety, Instructional and Youth Racing Programs and increase the life cycle of your safety boats.
- Every club should do a comprehensive safety check of all grounds, docks, lifts and club houses before your sailing season starts. No matter how "safe" you think your area is – there's always room for improvement.
- 5. Engaging women to sail will make for a strong sailing club

And that's just the tip of the iceberg!

Now, the "downside" to attending these events is when you aren't watching, you get volunteered for things... I'm now the Area E Regional Training Coordinator for US Sailing. So...if you have instructors that need certified, let me know and we'll get courses set up for you!


