







How do I register?

Go to www.interlakenationals2022.com

Tabs along the top help you navigate.

Start at **Registration** and select Champions, Challengers, Womens and Juniors. Filling out the form adds you name to the scratch list. As you register, the fee is automatically added to the cart. The "Cart" icon is on the upper right of the page. Click on that icon to complete the payment process.

Do I have to register for everything at once?

You can go to checkout and pay for registration only; then return later for meals, gear or do it all at once. Each time a purchase is made, and after registering you will receive an email confirmation. We receive one as well, for verification. Please bring it with you to expedite the checkin process.

The notation '[NP]' in a rule means that a boat may not protest another boat for breaking that rule. This changes RRS 60.1(a). The notation '[DP]' in a rule means that the Protest Committee may impose a penalty less than disqualification for breaking that rule. This changes RRS 64.2.

1 RULES

- **1.1** The event is governed by the rules as defined in The Racing Rules of Sailing
- **1.2** The US Sailing Prescriptions to RRS 63.1 do not apply.

2 SAILING INSTRUCTIONS

The sailing instructions will be available at 12:00pm on July 18, 2022 at http://www.InterlakeNationals2022.com and at Mohican Sailing Club 2187 Mifflin Township Road, 1265 Lucas, OH 44843.

3 COMMUNICATION

- 3.1 In accordance with Article III Section 14 of the ISCA Specifications, the Race Committee may make courtesy broadcasts to competitors on VHF radio. The channel will be stated in the SIs.
- 3.2 [DP] While racing, except in an emergency, a boat shall not make voice or data transmissions and shall not receive voice or data communication that is not available to all boats.

4 ELIGIBILITY AND ENTRY

- 4.1 The event is open to all Interlakes and persons who meet the ISCA requirements for sanctioned events contained in Article VI of the Bylaws, who are members of the Association, and who have registered by July 19, 2022 at www.interlakesailing.org
- **4.2** Eligible boats may enter by completing the entry form and submitting it, together with the required fee, to at www.InterlakeNationals2022.com by July 20, 2022.
- 4.3 To be considered an entry in the event, a boat shall complete all registration requirements, including measurement, and pay all fees by July 20, 2022 by 17:30.
- **4.4** Women's Division: The skipper and helmsperson must be female.
- **4.5** Junior Division: The skipper and helmsperson must not have reached their 19th birthday by July 20, 2022
- **4.6** Masters Division: The skipper must be at least 60 years old by July 20, 2022.

- 7.1 The total number of races attempted each day for the Championship Division is nominally three and up to five. The total number of races each day for the Challenger Division is one less per day than the number of races for the Championship Division.
- 7.2 The total number of races to be attempted for the Women's and Junior Championships is three.

8 EQUIPMENT INSPECTION

- **8.1** Each boat must complete the boat and sail measurement forms supplied at registration before the close of registration.
- **8.2** Each boat must carry the equipment specified in Article VI Section 4 of the ISCA Bylaws while racing.

9 VENUE

The races will be conducted in the waters of Charles Mills Lake, Mohican Sailing Club 2187 Mifflin Township Road 1265 Lucas, OH 44843. 40° 44' 41.87'', -82° 22' 23.64''

10 COURSES

The courses will be windward-leeward, triangular, or some combination using dropped marks.

11 SCORING

- 11.1 Three races are required to be completed in the Championship and Challenger Series to constitute a series. If four or fewer races are completed in the Championship or Challenger Series, a boat's series score shall be the total of her race scores. This changes RRS A2.1.
- 11.2 One race is required to be completed in the Junior and Women's Championship Series to constitute a series. A boat's series score shall be the total of her race scores. This changes RRS A2.1.

12 RISK STATEMENT

RRS 3 states: 'The responsibility for a boat's decision to participate in a race or to continue to race is hers alone.' By participating in this event each competitor agrees and acknowledges that sailing is a potentially dangerous activity with inherent risks. These risks include strong winds and rough seas, sudden changes in weather, failure of equipment, boat handling errors, poor seamanship by other boats, loss of balance on an unstable platform and fatigue resulting in increased risk of injury. Inherent in the sport of sailing is the risk of permanent, catastrophic injury or death by drowning, trauma, hypothermia or other causes.

13 INSURANCE

Each participating boat shall be insured with valid third-party liability insurance with a minimum cover of \$300,000 per incident or the equivalent.

14 PRIZES

<u>Intercom Tips and Techniques</u>

The Measure of an Interlake

Although boats and sails must always conform to the plans, specifications, and bylaws of the ISCA to carry the name of Interlake and are always subject to a measurement protest if a competitor suspects otherwise, formal measurement of our boat most often occurs at the National Championship Series. Here's how to sail through the 2022 Nationals measurement quickly and smoothly:

Sails

Fill out the sail measurement sheet provided at inperson registration, and make sure it stays with your sails until they are stamped. Two full suits of sails can be approved for use during Nationals.

Sails stamped at a previous nationals and that have not been altered since then need only be stamped again. Please keep these in their bags, with only the previously stamped clew pulled out for quick access (the measurement crew is there to measure and stamp sails – unbagging and rebagging slows the process down).

Previously unstamped sails, or sails that have been altered since their last measurement, must be fully measured. Check that your sailmaker sewed on a royalty sticker, as they cannot be approved without one. Please help the sail measurement crew move quickly by unpacking and repacking your sails for them at the station.

Boats:

Fill out your provided boat measurement sheet and have it ready for the measuring crew. Have a lifting bridle ready. Empty the boat of everything that cannot be in the boat when it is weighed. The rule is strict – do not leave tools, snacks, tape, flag, bags, Tupperware containers, spare parts, etc. in the boat. It will just delay weighing while

you remove them. The boat and lines should not be wet or the measurement team may ask you to come back when they are dry. Have all required safety equipment ready for inspection.

If the boat has been previously measured and has not been subsequently altered (for example, CB trunk cut down, repositioned mast/boom bands, etc.) then the owner need only sign the measurement form statement to that effect and have the boat weighed and safety equipment checked. This is what the majority of boats at Nationals will experience.

Any boat that has not been previously measured, and any boat that has changed ownership since its last measurement, will go through full measurement. The mast must be down for some measurements – talk to the measurement crew and/or chief measurer to plan the sequence. The measurement team will appreciate your help in maneuvering your trailer, dropping or raising the mast, and any other logistics, but understand that only they will be making the judgment calls on placing the ends of tape measures, steadying the boat under the scales, and manipulating other measurement tools.

Finally, please show up well before the closing time the NRC has set for measurement for your event. Every chief measurer has stories of last-minute arrivals that resulted in missing dinner, an owner working frantically to comply with a disqualifying fault, or telling the owner that they were not going to be able to sail Nationals. You do not want to be one of those stories, so please show up with plenty of time to spare.

We want everyone to sail through measurement quickly and smoothly on shore, and race safely on the water!

Ask a Judge

Clark Chapin has been a US Sailing Certified Judge since 1988 and is currently a National Judge.

(Adapted from a recent email discussion)

Dear Clark:

I have an interesting rules question that came up racing the other day. I was sailing a beat coming up on the port tack lay line outside the circle. I had someone overlapped inside of me (just slightly, but that's irrelevant). He shouted ahead that if I duck the starboard boat that is coming up, that I have to give him room to duck as well since the starboard tackers would be an obstruction. That got me thinking. That sounds like a load of BS that people shout in order to get what they want. Is that right? He has every opportunity to tack to avoid an issue. I would not be impeding that. Just because he would rather not tack, or that it is inside the circle seems irrelevant. Who is correct?

Dear Curious:

Oooo, good question. Let's break this down. All of this assumes, as you say, you're on port tack on a beat and outside the zone with a boat overlapped to windward, however slightly:

1. Is a starboard tack boat an obstruction?

Obstruction An object that a boat could not pass without changing course substantially, if she were sailing directly towards it and one of her hull lengths from it. An object that can be safely passed on only one side and an object, area or line so designated by the sailing instructions are also *obstructions*. However, a boat *racing* is not an *obstruction* to other boats unless they are required to *keep clear* of her or, if rule 22 applies, avoid her. A vessel under way, including a boat *racing*, is never a continuing *obstruction*.

You, as a port tack boat, are required to keep clear of a starboard tack boat, so the starboard tacker is an obstruction.

2. So, you have to avoid an obstruction. You also have a boat that is overlapped with you to windward, so they must keep clear under rule 11. What is the rule regarding passing an obstruction?

19 ROOM TO PASS AN OBSTRUCTION

. . .

19.2 Giving Room at an Obstruction

- (a) A right-of-way boat may choose to pass an obstruction on either side.
- (b) When boats are *overlapped*, the outside boat shall give the inside boat *room* between her and the *obstruction*, unless she has been unable to do so from the time the *overlap* began.

This means that you can't just "run a pick play" on an overlapped windward boat – If you choose to pass the starboard tacker to leeward, you have to allow the overlapped windward boat room to pass as well.

3. On the other hand, you might want to tack instead of passing behind the starboard tacker. In that case, rule 20 applies:

20 ROOM TO TACK AT AN OBSTRUCTION

20.1 Hailing

A boat may hail for *room* to tack and avoid a boat on the same *tack*. However, she shall not hail unless

(a) she is approaching an *obstruction* and will soon need to make a substantial course change to avoid it safely, and (b) she is sailing close-hauled or above.

In addition, she shall not hail if the *obstruction* is a *mark* and a boat that is *fetching* it would be required to change course as a result of the hail.

20.2 Responding

- (a) After a boat hails, she shall give a hailed boat time to respond.
- (b) A hailed boat shall respond even if the hail breaks rule 20.1.
- (c) A hailed boat shall respond either by tacking as soon as possible, or by immediately replying 'You tack' and then giving the hailing boat room to tack and avoid her.
- (d) When a hailed boat responds, the hailing boat shall tack as soon as possible.
- (e) From the time a boat hails until she has tacked and avoided a hailed boat, rule 18.2 does not apply between them.

In summary, you have three choices:

- A. You can go astern of the starboard tacker, in which case you must give room to the overlapped windward boat to also pass astern;
- B. You can hail the windward boat for room to tack; or
- C. If the windward boat is only slightly overlapped, you can bear off enough to break the overlap. At that point, they are no longer entitled to room between you and the obstruction and they can follow you around the starboard tacker's stern.

Inside the zone, it gets trickier because if the starboard tacker is fetching the mark (meaning they can round it without tacking, even if they have to shoot head-to-wind) and you tack inside the zone and cause them to sail above close hauled to avoid them, you've broken rule 18.3.

Does this help?

Dear Clark:

I guess I never considered a starboard boat as an obstruction... just having the right of way. Is every port/starboard and windward/leeward an obstruction?

I think you are saying I would have to give him room even though he is free to tack to and avoid a boat because I do not have the right to dictate what he should do, as he has the right of way over me. If I wasn't there he would have the choice of doing either.

That makes sense. I have options ahead of time to change the game a bit, like breaking the overlap or telling him I need to tack.

Dear Curious:


You have the option of deciding whether to duck the starboard tack boat or hailing for room to tack, but if you decide to duck, you now have the obligation to provide room for an inside overlapped boat, the same as if the two of you were approaching an anchored power boat.
